

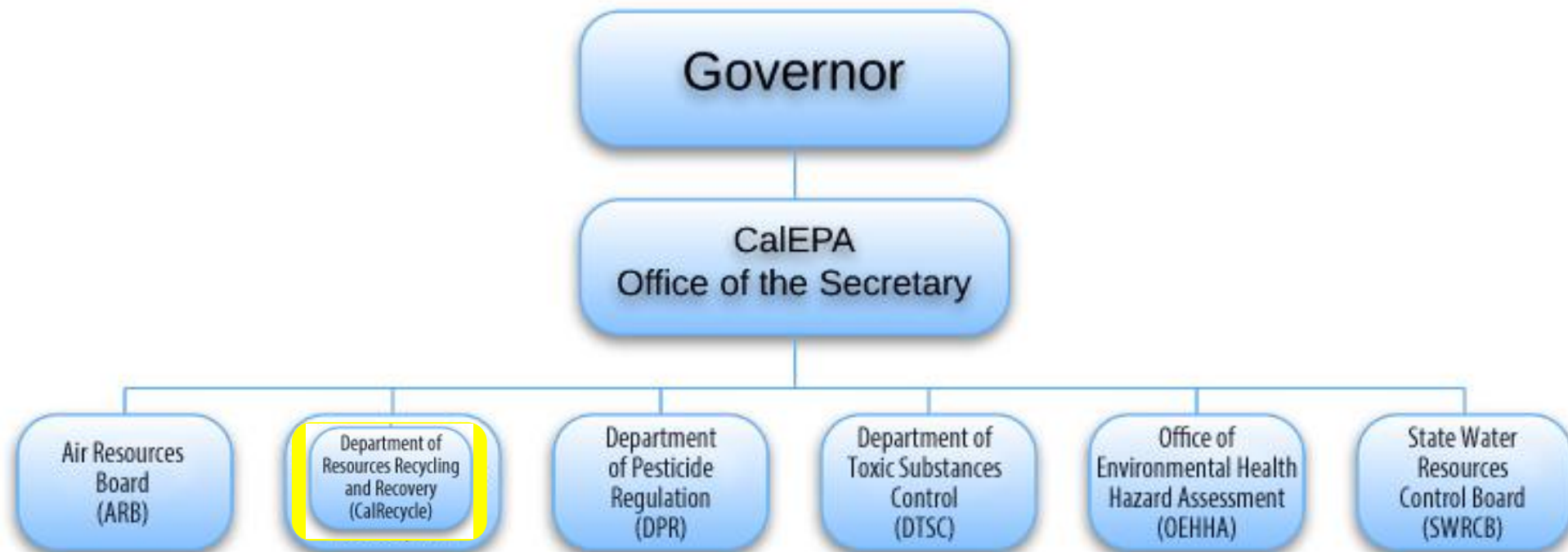

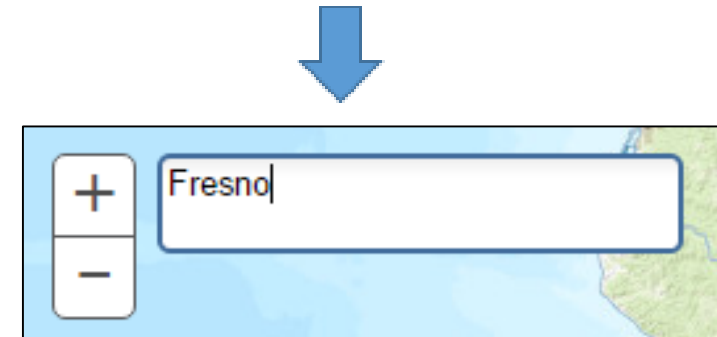

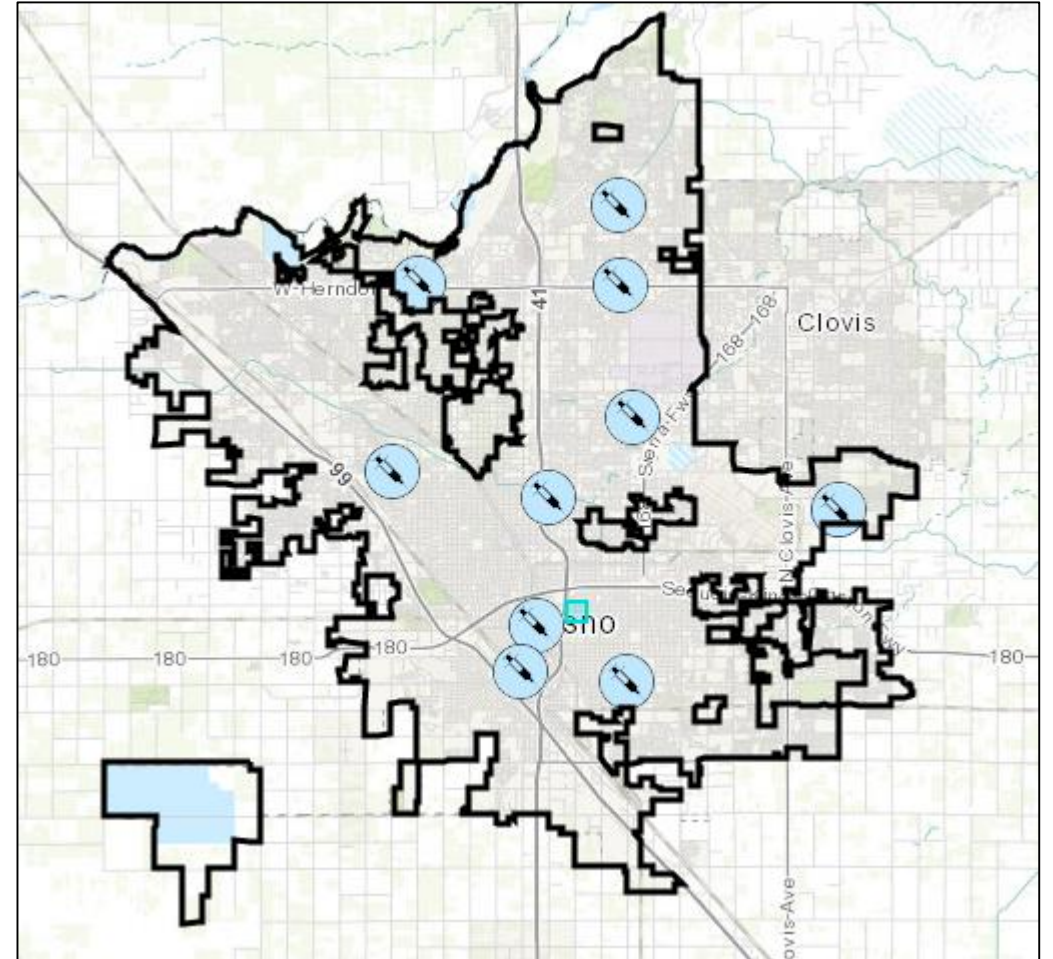

CalRecycle has recently completed two major waste characterization studies: a [Disposal-Facility-Based Study](#), which analyzes the material disposed in the state's waste stream; and a [Commercial Generator Study](#), which includes data on materials disposed and recycled from the state's commercial sector. This information is critical for waste management planning--and for reaching our recycling and greenhouse gas reduction goals.

Grant Funding for Cleanup

Solid Waste Cleanup

Cleanup of solid waste sites and solid waste at co-disposal sites where the responsible party either cannot be identified or is unwilling or unable to pay for the timely remediation of cleanup needed to protect public health and safety and/or environment. Local governments can finance a wide range of remediation projects. Two grant programs, one of which is a matching grant, are offered three times a year.

Grant Funding for Cleanup

Tire Amnesty

Provides funds for date-specific events for the public to either bring waste tires to convenient locations for proper management up to twice per month per location, or can consist of a coupon program that allows citizens to bring in waste tires on specified days.

Grant Funding for Cleanup

Tire Cleanup

Provides funding to local governments for the cost of collection, removal, transportation, recycling and disposal of California waste tires from illegal tire piles and areas where illegal dumping has occurred along public rights-of-way.

Grant Funding for Cleanup

Farm and Ranch

Provides funding for the cleanup of illegal solid waste sites on farm or ranch property; parcel(s) zoned for agricultural use, where unauthorized solid waste disposal has occurred, and where the site(s) is(are) in need of cleanup in order to abate a nuisance or public health and safety threat and/or a threat to the environment.

CalRecycle's 2016/17 Greenhouse Reduction Fund (GGRF) Grant Program

- AB 1613 - \$40 million for FY 2016/17
Tentative allocation:
- \$24 million – Organics
- \$12 million for Digestion Projects (\$4 mil max award)
- \$12 million Composting Projects - \$3 million max award
- \$9 million -- Recycled Fiber, Plastic, and Glass \$5 million -- Food Waste Prevention and Rescue ~\$2 million -- Administration

Grant Funding for Food Waste Prevention and Rescue

- To reduce greenhouse gas emissions by establishing new or expanding existing food waste prevention projects to reduce the amount of food being landfilled.
 - Food waste prevention projects are projects that prevent food waste from being generated or divert food from landfills.
 - Food rescue projects result in rescued food being distributed to people, with any food waste residuals being sent to composting or digestion when available in the service area.

Grant Funding for Food Waste Prevention and Rescue

- \$5 million allocation for FY 2016/17
 - small projects \$25,000 to \$100,000
 - large projects \$100,001 to \$500,000
- Timeline (*tentative*)
 - Application Release – April 2017
 - Due Date – June 2017
 - Awards – October 2017

Extended Producer Responsibility (EPR) and providing convenient collection

- EPR programs ensure proper management of discarded products that are too problematic/costly for local governments to manage.
- EPR programs are designed, financed, and operated by product manufacturers – not government. State government sets targets, oversees the programs, and provides enforcement when necessary.
- Convenient consumer collection is a focus of EPR programs.

Illegal Dumping



- Illegal dumping is unsightly, is a risk to public health, and detracts from community values.
- State statutes charge CalRecycle and Local Enforcement Agencies with remediation of illegal disposal sites.
- State statutes include laws on illegal dumping, but no state or local agency is charged with program responsibility for the abatement of illegal dumping.
- Local illegal dumping abatement and enforcement programs need to be developed that include local political buy-in, local ordinances, funding, personnel and equipment.

Illegal dumping programs need to include:

- Prevention and Outreach- facilitating proper disposal, mandatory refuse collection
- Cleanup and Abatement- include roles for volunteer organizations, lien authority
- Enforcement – essential for program success

What is a SEP?

Supplemental Environmental Project—an environmentally beneficial project that a person subject to an enforcement action voluntarily agrees to undertake in settlement of the action and to offset a portion of a civil penalty

Environmental Justice Supplemental Environmental Projects (SEP)

CalRecycle is developing a policy and procedures for Supplemental Environmental Projects (SEP) as consistent with [Chapter 585, Statutes of 2015](#) (Atkins, AB 1071). AB 1071, introduced by Assemblywoman Toni Atkins and signed into law in October 2015, intends to develop strategies for identifying and addressing gaps in existing CalEPA programs in order to achieve greater environmental justice. Once identified, the implementation of SEPs will help bridge these gaps. A SEP allows entities in violation of environmental laws to voluntarily undertake environmental projects as part of settlement of an enforcement action.

CalRecycle is planning community outreach workshops in three California cities in July and August 2016 to discuss SEPs with the public and community based organizations.

- Fresno: August 1
- Sacramento: August 10

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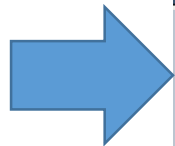
